Distractions in Prayer (from Fr. Michael)

We all want to pray well. To help us, I recommend a book by Thomas Dubay called *Prayer Primer: Igniting A Fire Within*. All of us get distracted in prayer at times. Fr. Dubay has the following question and answer in his book:

Question: I am often pestered with distractions in prayer. I really do not want them, but is there anything I can do to get rid of them? I try but don't much succeed.

Answer: The first thing you can do is be at peace. As long as distractions are not deliberate or intentional,

they do much less harm than you think. If you sincerely want to pray, and you try reasonably well, you are praying. As St. Teresa puts it, "Your will is with His Majesty." Gently turn your mind back to Him when you notice that it has strayed. You are succeeding.

Listen to the following story about a distraction in prayer. St Bernard of Clairvaux was once traveling with a poor, uneducated farmer, who noticed that the abbot kept his eyes cast downward. When the farmer asked why the saint wasn't looking at the beautiful countryside, Bernard explained that he wanted to avoid distractions while praying.

In response, the farmer boasted, "I'm never distracted when I pray."

The saint objected, "I don't believe it. Now let me make a deal with you. If you can say the Our Father without one distraction, I'll give you this mule I'm riding. But if you don't succeed, you must come with me and be a monk."

The farmer agreed and began praying aloud confidently, "Our Father, who art in Heaven, hallowed by thy name..." Then, after pausing for moment, he asked St Bernard, "Does that include the saddle and the bridle, too?"

Here is an idea. Before we pray, we tell God that we want to focus and pray well. In other words, we pray before we pray. We can turn distractions into prayers. Whatever we think about while we are praying, we give it to God. For example, if we begin to think about food, we say to God, "I know you will provide food later on." Then we gently turn back to Him in prayer.

Prayer for Power from the Holy Spirit

Lord, in the book of Acts You said "you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you...and you shall be My witnesses...to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). Give me a fresh anointing, Lord, and a fuller release of Your Spirit's power and gifts that are already present in me through water Baptism and Confirmation.

Divine Lord, I do not wish to be just Your follower. Take away any indifference that I have toward Your Divine Presence in me. Change and release that passive indwelling power of Your Spirit in me into that active infilling power. Let that "rose bud" become a "rose bloom," the "acorn" become the "oak tree," so that I may experience that same infilling power as did the disciples at the first Pentecost.

By that same power, give me a new inner strength over the sinful habits of my life. Help me to become an effective witness for You and draw others to You according to Your plan and purpose in my life.

Gems of Wisdom from the *Diary* of St. Faustina

811. When I entered my solitude, I heard these words: **At the hour of their death, I defend as My own glory every soul that will say this chaplet; or when others say it for a dying person, the indulgence is the same. When this chaplet is said by the bedside of a dying person, God's anger is placated, unfathomable mercy envelops the soul, and the very depths of My tender mercy are moved for the sake of the sorrowful Passion of My Son.**

Quick Apologetics (Defending Your Faith)—Call No Man Father

One time when I was working at Lackland Air Force Base as a chaplain candidate, a good man asked me, "Why do you call your priests 'father'? The Bible says not to call any man 'father' in Matthew 23:9."

Matthew 23:9 does state: "Call no one on earth your father; you have but one Father in heaven."

I told him that if we took everything literally in the Bible that I would be a blind paraplegic. He smiled. He knew what I was saying. In Matthew 5:27-30, Jesus basically says that if our eyes cause us to sin, we should pluck them out, and if our hands cause us to sin, we should cut them off. We know that Jesus is, in this passage, trying to get us to think about avoiding sin, not to maim our bodies.

Anyway, I explained to him that we needed to look at the whole Bible in context. Even God the Father called human men fathers in the fourth commandment: "Honor your father and mother." Also, in Romans 4:16-17, St. Paul refers to Abraham as "the father of us all." In 1 Corinthians 4:15, St. Paul says, "You do not have many fathers, for I became your father in Christ Jesus through the Gospel."

So there are many times in the Bible where 'father' is permitted. Priests are called 'father' in the sense that they are called to be spiritual fathers to everyone meet. Priests ask God the Father to participate in His Fatherhood. God is the origin and source of all fatherhood. He is perfect in love and mercy. All of us pray to the Father to be more like Him.
