Daily Prayer of Surrender

Thanks for giving me a biological father in order to bring me into this world to share in Your divine nature by Your gift of grace. Jesus, I believe in You and receive You as my Lord and Savior. I hold nothing back. Jesus, You have my permission to live in my heart. Conform my heart and mind into Yours; let me love and think as You do. Holy Spirit, bring me to a deeper conversion to the person of Jesus Christ. Help me follow Your daily promptings. Immerse me, Holy Spirit, and let Your gifts come alive in me. Ordinary Means of Salvation and Being Free in the Lord—Cooperating with God’s Plan and Grace

-Luke 9:23-24: Then [Jesus] said to all, “If anyone wishes to come after Me, he must deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow Me. For whoever wishes to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for My sake will save it.” **[Surrender daily to Jesus!]**

1. Develop a deep faith life. (Ask for the gift of faith daily and spend time learning truth from the Bible, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, the lives of the saints, etc.)

2. Improve your prayer life. (Will you spend an hour in prayer each day? This can be broken into various parts throughout the day: pray with Bible, 15 minutes; Rosary, 15 minutes; listen to God in silence, 15 minutes, etc.)

3. Live a virtuous and moral life. (Virtue = repeated good acts to build up God’s Kingdom, such as living the Beatitudes and performing the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy. Moral life = follow the Ten Commandments and the Precepts of the Church.)

4. Live a sacramental life. (Mass on Sundays and Holy Days; also try for daily Mass and frequent Confession. Receiving a Sacrament is a “direct touch” from God.)

The Eight Beatitudes (Mt 5:3-10)

1. Blessed are the poor in spirit: for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.
2. Blessed are the meek: for they shall possess the land.
3. Blessed are they who mourn: for they shall be comforted.
4. Blessed are they that hunger and thirst after justice: for they shall have their fill.
5. Blessed are the merciful: for they shall obtain mercy.
6. Blessed are the clean of heart: for they shall see God.
7. Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called children of God.
8. Blessed are they that suffer persecution for justice’ sake, for theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven.

The Seven Corporal Works of Mercy

1. To feed the hungry.
2. To give drink to the thirsty.
3. To clothe the naked.
4. To shelter the homeless.
5. To visit the sick.
6. To visit the imprisoned.
7. To bury the dead. [Do not scatter ashes.]

The Seven Spiritual Works of Mercy

1. To counsel the doubtful.
2. To instruct the ignorant.
3. To admonish the sinner.
4. To comfort the sorrowful.
5. To forgive all injuries.
6. To bear wrongs patiently.
7. To pray for the living and the dead.

The Ten Commandments

1. I am the Lord thy God; Thou shalt not have other gods besides Me.
2. Thou shalt not take the Name of the Lord thy God in vain.
3. Remember to keep holy the Lord’s Day.
4. Honor thy father and thy mother.
5. Thou shalt not murder.
6. Thou shalt not commit adultery.
7. Thou shalt not steal.
8. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.
9. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor’s wife.
10. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbor’s goods.

The Six Precepts of the Church (Catholic Duties)

1. To go to Mass and refrain from servile work on Sundays and Holy Days.
2. To go to Confession at least once a year.
3. To receive the Eucharist at least once a year, during the Easter Season.
4. To observe the days of fasting and abstinence.
5. To help to provide for the needs of the Church according to one’s abilities and station in life.
6. To obey the marriage laws of the Church.

Praying with the Bible: A Brief Introduction to Ignatian Biblical Meditation (rational reflection):

1. **Begin:** Consider how God looks upon you and loves you; become aware of being in God’s presence. Stand for a moment, bow if you wish, then be seated for prayer.
2. **Preparatory Prayer:** Offer to God all your will and actions, especially in this time of prayer. Ask God for a specific grace that you need and desire right now (peace, consolation, hope, etc.).
3. **Meditate on the Biblical Text** that you have selected:
 - Read** the biblical text through slowly, recalling what it is about; then let it come alive for you!
 - Reflect** on the truths God wants to teach you in this text.
 - Ponder** the meaning of each word, phrase, and sentence.
 - Focus** on two or three points (words, phrases, images, ideas) that stand out to you.
 - Embrace** what God is saying to you; let your heart be moved with love and desire.
 - Notice** what is going on inside you as you pray: joy, sorrow, peace, confusion, love, anger, etc.
 - If you get distracted or your mind wanders, gently return to the biblical text and your focal points.
4. **Colloquy:** Enter into a short personal conversation with Jesus (or God the Father, or the Holy Spirit). Speak heart-to-heart, as if conversing with a close friend.
5. **Closing Prayer:** Conclude by praying the Our Father, Hail Mary, or another familiar/favorite prayer. You might stand, kneel, bow, raise your hands, or adopt another posture to mark the end of your prayer.

Gems of Wisdom from the *Diary* of Saint Faustina

1019. March 18, 1937. I have come to know that I have received a certain grace that brings me into great intimacy and communion with the Lord. He gives me to know this by means of an interior light. He allows me to know His greatness and holiness and how graciously He lowers himself to me. He gives me an exclusive knowledge of His love for me, and of how He is Lord of absolutely all things, and also of how He gives Himself to a soul while suspending all the laws of nature. He acts as He wills.

Quick Apologetics (Defending Your Faith)—The Bible

We, as Catholic Christians, use a Bible that has 73 books (called the canon of Scripture); there are 46 books in the Old Testament, 27 in the New Testament. The canon of Scripture was settled at the Council of Rome in 382, under the authority of Pope Damasus I. This canon included the Septuagint, or Alexandrian Canon (written in Greek) of the Old Testament—46 books. It was soon reaffirmed on numerous occasions. The 73 books were affirmed at the Council of Hippo in 393 and at the Council of Carthage in 397. In 405 Pope Innocent I reaffirmed the canon in a letter to Bishop Exuperius of Toulouse. All of these canons were identical to our modern Catholic Bible. The Church also reaffirmed the 73 books of the Bible at the Councils of Florence (1442), Trent (1546), Vatican I (1870), and Vatican II (1965).

So why do Protestants have 66 books—seven less books? Historically, near 100 A.D. Jewish leaders rejected seven of “our books” [Wisdom, Sirach, Judith, Baruch, Tobit, and 1 and 2 Maccabees], mainly because they could not find versions of them written in Hebrew. This Jewish version is called the **Palestinian Canon**. In 1529, Martin Luther chose the Palestinian Canon, using the same reason to reject the seven books—he could not find the Hebrew version.

However, close to 1950, archaeologists found Hebrew copies of the seven books in question in the Dead Sea scrolls at Qumran. Who would have known?!

In the New Testament, there are 300 quotations taken from the **Septuagint**, which was used by Jesus and the New Testament writers. If Jesus used the Septuagint, we had better do the same.
